


Gorge Fire Festival ---





The clear water of the Ishikari River combined with harsh meteorological conditions creates stunning natural works of art. The ice corridors are illuminated at night, producing a fantastic atmosphere. The festival's spectacular fireworks display is not to be missed.



Introduction to Mt. Kurodake

The mascots of the Kurodake Ropeway -Nakki the Pika and Shima the Chipmunk introduce their habitat - Mt. Kurodake.

Mt. Kurodake is a peak in the Daisetsu Mountain Range, also known as the central highland of Hokkaido. The Daisetsu Mountains have been called Kamui Mintara, an Ainu phrase meaning the playground of the Gods. The lava plateaus between peaks are home to more than 300 species of alpine flora. The magnifi-

cent landscape represents a paradise above the clouds worthy of its Ainu name.



Geological formation of Sounkyo Gorge

Sounkyo Gorge is known for its spectacular precipitous cliffs that stretch for over 20 kilometers.

About 30,000 years ago, a major eruption occurred at a central volcano during the formation of the Omote Daisetsu Area. Pyroclastic flows and glowing clouds covered mountains and valleys in the Daisetsu Mountains, and deposits as thick as 150 to 200 meters dammed up the Ishikari River. The deposits became square and hexagonal columnar joints as they grew cold and hard. Erosion for over 10,000 years by the Ishikari River formed the magnificent Sounkyo Gorge.

Name: Mt. Kurodake

Characteristics:

It has a ropeway between its base and the 5th station and a chairlift from the 5th to 7th station. Despite its name meaning "a black mountain" in Japanese, it changes its colors every season - green in summer. red in autumn and white in winter.

Most charming features:

Maneki-iwa (beckoning rocks) at the 9th station and its pointed summit

Similarity to Alaska - Climate and vertical vegetation distribution -

Mt. Kurodake is 1,984 m high, and the annual average temperature at its peak is -3.8℃, which is similar to the temperature in the northern central area of Alaska. Hiking Mt. Kurodake provides an opportunity to enjoy vegetation similar to that of Alaska

Comparable to a mountain as high as 3,000 meters Taking only 30 minutes to the 7th station!

Since Hokkaido's latitude is higher than that of Japan's main island of Honshu, the environment of 2,000-meter-high peaks in the Daisetsu Mountain Range corresponds to that of 3,000-meterhigh mountains in Honshu. Although such high peaks are not easily accessible there, here on Mt. Kurodake, an approximately 90-minute hike after getting off the chairlift will take you to its peak.

Mt. Kurodake has a clear-cut vegetation distribution. Changes of vegetation zones on the mountain are recognizable from the ropeway and chairlift.




> The Nakki and Shima gondolas will whisk you to the 5th station. You'll feel as if you are flying.


It's July now, but I can see snow!





†The station building and the Chairlift Take-off Platform are connected by an approx. 200meter-long walking trail. Colorful alpine flowers bloom along the trail from June to August.

→The walking trail on the right side will take you to Takamatsudai, where you can get an up-close view of Mt. Kurodake and Japanese alpine cherry blossoms, the nation's latest blooming species, are everywhere. Ezo Asiatic chipmunks, which eat the cherries, frequently appear there.

An approximately 90-minute-long hiking trail from the 7th station to the mountain top offers an opportunity to enjoy a variety of alpine plants because vegetation continues close to the peak. Don't miss the chance to visit the playgrounds of the gods.

The downwind northeastern slope is affected by heavy snowfall, avalanches and other weather phenomena in winter, and is home to tall herbaceous plants and avalanche-proof low trees, such as weigela middendorffiana and lonicera chamissoi.

The southwestern slop extending from the mountain top to Kurodake Hut is exposed to the wind. Under a harsh low-temperature and dry environment with little snow cover, the slope is home to resilient low shrubs, such as arctous alpina var. japonica.

Products of the glacial period

During the glacial period, Hokkaido was connected by land with the continent, and many creatures went back and forth between the two areas. As temperatures rose, Hokkaido was separated from the continent, causing cold-region creatures to flee to high mountains. Those creatures live only in alpine regions today. Pikas and parnassius eversmanni butterflies are typical of such creatures.

Kurodake Hut



Built in 1923, the hut has served as a hiking base in the Daisetsu Mountains, where climbers stay overnight or take a break. It is equipped with composting toilet facilities. Near the hut, snow lingers even in August and beautiful flowers bloom as abundant water is available.

- ◆Overnight stay: ¥2,000
- ◆ Tent-area usage fee: ¥500
- Sleeping bag rental: ¥1,000 (incl. ¥200 as for toilet facility maintenance)

- Chairlift operation starts 30 minutes after the ropeway operation begins and ends 30 minutes before the ropeway operation ends.
- The ropeway and chairlift operation may be suspended for maintenance.
- The ropeway and chairlift are accessible by wheelchair users.
- No pets are allowed in the ropeway or chairlift.

Access

By public transportation

Take a Dohoku bus bound for Sounkyo from JR Asahikawa or Kamikawa Station. The ropeway is about three minutes on foot from the last bus stop.

By car

Take the Asahikawa-Mombetsu Highway, get off the highway at the Kamikawa-Sounkyo Interchange, and drive along Route 39. Drive approximately 30 minutes toward Kitami. (À 60-vehicle parking lot is available for free of charge.)

(3 hours from Sapporo, 1.5 hours from Asahikawa)
